

The Organization

The overall concept of the 100 Black Men organization was born in New York City in 1963, when a diverse group of concerned and successful African American men began to meet to explore ways of improving conditions in their communities. They envisioned an organization that would implement programs designed to improve the quality of life for African Americans and other minorities.

These members were successful black men from various walks of life who decided to pool their skills and experiences to ensure the future of their communities by aiming an intense number of resources toward youth development. They eventually adopted the name 100 Black Men, Inc. Among the founders were David Dinkins, Livingston Wingate, Andrew Hatcher, and Jackie Robinson.

In the 1970s, the concept of developing individual, independent chapters in other cities took hold, and in 1976, the 100 Black Men of New Jersey was formed by Dr. William Hayling and other colleagues. A movement had been born. Men across the country began to form 100 Black Men organizations in cities like Los Angeles, St. Louis, Indianapolis, Pittsburgh, Atlanta, San Francisco/Oakland Bay area, Nassau/Suffolk, and Sacramento.

In 1986, the nine successful chapters met and voted to create 100 Black Men of America, Inc. as a national confederation. Currently, there are more than 100 chapters and more than 10,000 members. The Board of Directors consists of the presidents of the local chapters. For the past four decades, chapters across the nation have touched the lives of over 60,000 young people.

100 Black Men of Madison, Inc.

100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. began its operation in 1994 and was incorporated in 1995 as a nonprofit organization comprised of members from many professional disciplines in the greater Madison area. The Madison chapter was established with the concept that it would make a positive difference in the lives of area youth, especially African American males and females, through mentoring, education, health and wellness, and economic development programs. The 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. is an affiliate of 100 Black Men of America, Inc.

The 100 Black Men of Madison organization has and will continue to be a positive voice for the community youth of color, especially African American males and females, and support academic achievement and reinforce social responsibility.

Mission, Vision and Values

The Mission of 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. is to improve the quality of life within our communities and enhance educational and economic opportunities for all African Americans. 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. seeks to serve as a beacon of leadership by utilizing our diverse talents to create environments where our children are motivated to achieve, and to empower our people to become self-sufficient shareholders in the economic and social fabric of the communities we serve. 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. is committed to the intellectual development of youth and the economic empowerment of the African American community based on the following precepts: respect for family, spirituality, justice, and integrity.

Major General Anderson assumed responsibility as Deputy Commander of the U.S. Army Human Resources Command 1 October 2010, serving in that capacity until her promotion to Major General in October 2011. Major General Anderson has served since October 2011 as the senior adviser to the Chief Army Reserve on policies and programs for the USAR including force structure, Congressional

budget and appropriations process, development of manpower and personnel policies, as well as Department of the Army and Department of Defense Matters.

African American History Challenge Bowl

The 100 Black Men of Madison African American History Challenge Bowl (AAHCB) is an educational program designed to enhance the study of African American history. The AAHCB is open to all Madison-area middle school students with the goal to encourage pride, self-worth and an appreciation of the African American legacy and

culture. It also is a challenging and fun way for students to expand their knowledge of African American History in highly competitive local and national competitions. The chief authority for the African American History Challenge bowl was "Life Upon These Shores - Looking at African-American History 1513 – 2008" by Henry Louis Gates, Jr.

Amazing students from the Badger Rock Middle School (Angela Moreno Lopez, Patrice Johnson, and Olivia Kennebeck) were crowned the 2014 African American History Challenge Bowl (AAHCB) winning team Saturday, 5 April. The 2014 AAHCB represented the nineteenth consecutive staging of this educational competition. The winning team from Badger Rock was awarded trophies, monetary prizes and an expense-paid trip to compete against other Chapters at the Annual 100 Black Men of America, Inc. Conference, which was held 11-15 June in Hollywood, Florida. Madison Middle School teams have won the National 100 Black Men of America Junior Championship in 1996, 2008 and 2012.






100 Black Men of Madison Receives University of Wisconsin-Madison Community Partnership Award 3 June 2014 – Madison, Wisconsin




In 2013 the 100 Black Men of Madison, at the direction of 100 Black Men of America Chairperson, Curley M. Dossman, established a Prostate Cancer Awareness initiative to increase focus on prostate cancer due to its growing rate among the general population with significantly higher incidence and death rates for African-American and Hispanic males. On 3 June 2014, the 100 Black Men of Madison and the Cancer Health Disparities Initiative were selected by the University of Wisconsin-Madison as recipients of the University-Community

Partnership Award for their combined work to address Prostate Cancer.

Friends, supporters, sponsors, and volunteers gathered for a fun day of golf to support the 100 Black Men of Madison and our endeavors to provide mentorship to our youth in Madison and Dane County. The format was a four-person best-ball scramble. Prizes and awards were given for the low-gross teams, longest drive, closest to the pin, putting contest, hole-in-one, and more. Individuals and teams were welcomed and non-golfers also were invited to attend and support this event at the Awards Dinner.

This golf outing is one of our signature events! This fundraising event helps support all of the 100 Black Men of Madison's activities, such as our Youth Mentoring Programs, Backpacks for Success Picnic, and Scholarships.

Economic Empowerment: Racial Equity and Social Justice Partnership – 100 Black Men of Madison and the City of Madison

As an outgrowth of the collaboration between the 100 Black Men of Madison and Mayor Paul Soglin, the City of Madison is establishing its Racial Equity and Social Justice Initiative as a core principle in all decisions, policies, and functions. Launched in the fall of 2013, the multifaceted initiative focuses on eliminating racial and social inequities in municipal government by implementing strategies in three main areas: Equity in City policies and budgets, Equity in City operations, and Equity in the community.

One of the major outgrowths of the collaboration between the 100 Black Men and the City of Madison is The City of Madison Public Works Contracting Disparity Study (Disparity Study), which is an analysis of whether there is a level playing field for minority- and women-owned firms when competing for City public works contracts and, if not, what might be done to create further opportunities.

Specific areas of the Disparity Study include whether or not there is a disparity between the actual utilization of minority- and women-owned firms for City public works contracts and the expected utilization based on those firms' availability for that work. The study also will examine any other evidence of race or gender discrimination affecting minority- and women-owned firms in the local marketplace that might limit their opportunity to compete for public contracts.

There will be extensive opportunity for community input as part of the Disparity Study including 40 interviews with owners and managers of minority-, female- and white male-owned businesses, as well as local trade associations and other groups. The study team also will conduct hundreds of telephone interviews with area businesses to determine their availability for specific types and sizes of City public works contracts and talk with them about local marketplace conditions. Public forums will be held in 2015.

A website, dedicated email address, and telephone hotline (608-441-511) are available to provide other avenues for community input. The study launched in April and will be completed by May 2015. Keen Independent Research is directing this study with assistance from a team of local and national experts. It is one of the leading disparity study research firms in the country.
